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Course Description:

This course is designed to teach fundamental principles of law to students with a non-legal background. The main aim is to create a basic understanding of legal systems and legal procedures to help them in the future to consider legal issues and apply on matters that they would face in their professional life and have general knowledge and perspective in a legal subject in their daily lives as citizens.

- 2. Having a better understanding of the functioning of law and legal systems
- 3. Understanding the interconnections between law and business life

- 5. Comprehend legal intersections in work and daily life
- 6. Have an understanding of the legal methodology

Personal and Key Skills:

- 7. Implement legal principles and methods on business decision-making processes
- 8. Cultivating public speaking manners through classroom discussions participation

Learning and Teaching Methods:

The discussions on course materials aim to develop analytical thinking, oral argument skills, speaking in public, and presenting ideas. Moreover, it is equally essential to create the ability to listen carefully and create an environment for active listening. In addition to these, creating a civilized discussion environment and participating in exchanging ideas is expected. To encourage the development of the skills mentioned above, every student is expected to have read the assigned reading material and participate in classroom discussions based on these readings. Also, students would be asked to respond to the others' claims and arguments to provide counter-arguments even it is not an argument that you necessarily support. Students would be randomly selected to answer the questions.

Additionally, to support students' learning process and lessen their study workload:

- 1) At the beginning of each class (as 'Starting -Note'), randomly chosen student(s) will asked to summarize the previous lecture's key points
- 2) At the end of each class (as 'Ending-Note'), randomly chosen student(s) would be asked
 - "What was the most important thing you learned today?"
 - "What was the most confusing topic today?"
 - "What important question remains unanswered?"

Students who participate in classroom discussions and "Starting-notes" and "Ending-Notes" would be graded on their participation. Students would not be penalized for having a "wrong" answer; the focus instead would be on the reasoning that you articulate for the answer you give. I would allow 3 to 5 students randomly picked from volunteering students for starting and ending notes during the class. Therefore, please <u>do not leave your participation in the last sessions</u> as you might not have a chance to do due to the increase in the number of participation requests.

Students are expected to read the assigned materials stated below for each session in advance.

Visual materials used during classes would be provided in .pdf or as web page links at the course web page.

The lecturer's materials cannot be used or shared on other platforms and shared with non-students of this class without prior written consent and permission.

Also, video recordings of the classes are not allowed to be taken.
