Course Description:

Operations management is the design and management by an organization of all of the activities required to transform input resources into output products and services. The operations manager plans production, schedules work, and controls resources so as to meet the goals of the organization. This course covers the issues underlying the management of operations, and introduces the student to a variety of tools and techniques used by operations managers exploring alternative means of implementing decisions. As such, this course is a survey of some of the major decisions and methods of operations management.

Class participation: A significant portion of the class will be spent discussing the related readings or exercises, mostly in groups. Please note that participation does <u>not</u> mean attendance. You are encouraged to actively engage with the given activities and make comments during class. You may also be called on randomly. In participation, quality is more important than quantity. Class participation will be graded at the end of the term on a scale of 0 to 4 (4=A). Students who have not submitted their Student Information Sheets (downloaded from the ODTUClass system) with a photo embedded by October 10th, 2025, to ODTUClass will <u>not</u> receive a participation grade.
