Course Description:

Successful management depends on the ability to improve resource use in all types of organizations. This course emphasizes the nature of the decision making process geared at attaining the goal of better resource use and the role that economic analysis plays in this process. The course will acquaint the students with the concepts of economic optimization, demand and supply analysis, production and cost analysis and market or competitive structure. Throughout the semester, the students will be exposed to the different aspects of managerial decision making with the help of the knowledge of microeconomics.
