BA4153 – INTERNATIONAL TRADE AND TRADE POLICY Course Schedule (Days, Times)

Course Description:

The significance of international trade has continued to grow for both states and firms, particularly since the aftermath of the Second World War. The objective of this course is to provide a comprehensive macrolevel analysis of how today's global trading system—established in the post-war era—was formulated through international organizations and regulations. In the initial phase of the analysis, the historical evolution of international trade and trade theories will be examined. Subsequently, students will explore the concepts of globalization and regionalization—a key dichotomy in international trade—while also studying the principal institutions and rules governing these frameworks (such as the World Trade Organization (WTO) and the European Union (EU)). Additionally, students will acquire practical experience in retrieving and interpreting international trade data (such as by country or product) using major trade databases. Following this, the course will analyze the development of Türkiye's foreign trade and policies, along with current trade regulations. Students will then conduct market research for export/import purposes and execute a foreign trade transaction. The course will conclude with a comprehensive evaluation semester review, discussing key learnings, feedback, and current trade issues (e.g., trade wars), alongside an assessment of the viability of a restructured global trading system. Upon completing this course, students will acquire a comprehensive understanding of the architecture, policy design, and operational execution of international trade.

This course is going to consist of a mixture of formal lectures, in-class discussions, group work and presentations.

Required Reading:

Before each class session, the instructor will provide students with original lecture notes covering the week's topic. These notes are researched and prepared by the instructor using multiple academic sources. The instructor will also share the bibliography used in preparing these materials as supplementary resources.
