Course Policies:

Midterm, final and make-up policy

Midterm and final exams will measure students' degree of knowledge of the conceptual material.

Students may write a make-up exam if they apply to the instructor within one week, at the latest, after the date of the exam unattended with a legitimate, documented, excuse. Make-up exams will be essay type.

Reading Assignments and Quizzes

Students will be assigned reading materials which will help them to explore theoretical background of the discussions and deepen their knowledge about the course content. Students are required to diligently read the assigned material and be ready for a quiz about their learnings. Quizzes will be given at the beginning of the class following the assignment of the reading material. Latecomers cannot take quizzes. Students not attending lecture after quizzes will get zero from quizzes. Note that quizzes are equivalent to exams; side conversations during quizzes, not stopping writing when instructed, or any other attempt to cheat will not be tolerated and result in zero mark without warning. **There is no make-up for assignment quizzes.**

Group Project

A significant component of this course is the group project. This project aims to foster teamwork, critical thinking, and the development of practical analytical skills. It presents an opportunity to demonstrate your comprehension of the course material in a real world context, making it an essential element of your overall learning experience.

There are ***two options*** for completing this group project:

Option 1: Students will be provided with carefully selected research topics. Your task will be to conduct an in-depth research process on the assigned topic and present it in the class. This project will enable you to deepen your understanding of talent management, identify emerging business trends, and integrate these trends into talent management practices.

Option 2: Students will be required to find a company with established talent management programs, conduct a comprehensive analysis of their practices and present their findings in the class. This project is designed to provide a practical application of the principles and knowledge acquired throughout the course. By evaluating and critiquing the selected company's talent management strategies, you will gain valuable insights into the practical application of talent management concepts.

The research topics, along with the detailed requirements for the presentation of the group project, will be shared at a later date.

Participation

Active participation and regular attendance in the classroom are integral components of this course. Being present in class and engaging in discussions is not merely a formality but a deliberate strategy to enhance your educational experience. When you attend class consistently and actively participate in discussions, you are more likely to grasp the course material thoroughly. This participation encourages critical thinking, allows the exchange of diverse viewpoints, and hones your communication and teamwork skills. Moreover, your involvement demonstrates a commitment to your own learning and fosters a positive learning environment. Beyond academics, it prepares you for success in professional settings, where effective communication and collaboration are often pivotal. Therefore, in this course, your active presence and participation are not just expectations; they are integral to your personal growth and your readiness for future career challenges. **There is no make-up for participation.**

USE OF AI TOOLS: In the context of this course, AI tools should be used responsibly and ethically for enhancing your learning experience.
